According to “How School Librarians Help Kids Achieve Standards”,

...test scores rise in both elementary and middle schools as library media specialists and teachers work together... Scores also increase with the amount of time library media specialists spends in-service trainers of other teachers, acquainting them with the rapidly changing world of information.

Test scores increase as library media specialists spend more time:

- planning cooperatively with teachers (7th grade),

- identifying materials for teachers,
- teaching information literacy skills to students,
- providing in-service training to teachers, and
- managing a computer network through which the library media program
- reaches beyond its own walls to classrooms, labs, and offices (7th grade).

The Website vs. the Blog

With a blog:

- Content can be altered or updated very easily: almost as easy as email
- Cool designs/ visually interesting art and written work can be published on the web
- Bloggers and readers can interact, communicating online

Blogs in General

- New Journalism: Vietnam vs. Iraq War
- Media: by-passing corporate media conglomerates.
- Who blogs? Answer: Just about everyone

Definitions

Blog: short for “we-blog” or “web blog”

•A weblog (or blog) is a website that is frequently updated, usually in reverse chronological order, and contains postings of content on a single web page.

Blogger: one who blogs

Post: the content (text, links, images) that a blogger creates on his/her blog

Types of Communication

Synchronous communication: individuals must be online to communicate.

- phone conversation

- face to face dialogue
- chat rooms (occur in real time)

Asynchronous communication: individuals do **not** need to be online to communicate. Response can be made hours, days or weeks later. (Email, blogs, wikis, facebook, threaded discussion at forums)

Online Identity

- Screen names-** nicknames, pseudonyms, pennames, that bloggers use to preserve their online identity.
- Online safety and protecting personal privacy
